"Bringing Back Every Last Hero Across the Globe" MPVA Plans to Repatriate Remains of Independence Activists in Brazil

- For the first time, a status survey was conducted on the gravesites of three Korean independence activists in South America: Kim Gi-joo and Han Eunggyu in Brazil, and Jang Deok-gi in Argentina.
- In addition, a status survey was carried out on the gravesites of independence activists Kim Jae-eun, Won Dae-sung, and Jung Sung-jang, who are buried in the United States.
- The Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs has identified a total of 346 gravesites of independence activists in 18 countries. Out of these, the remains of 148 have been successfully repatriated to Korea.

[Korea, April 4] Next year, marking the 80th anniversary of liberation, the remains of independence activists Kim Gi-joo and Han Eung-gyu, who are buried in Brazil on the opposite face of the Earth, will be repatriated to Korea.

The Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs (Minister Kang Jung-ai) announced in March that for the first time, a status survey was conducted on three gravesites of independence activists buried in Latin America such as Brazil and Argentina, and that it will repatriate the remains of the two members of the Korean Liberation Army from Brazil on the occasion of the 80th Anniversary of Liberation on August 15th, 2025.

This status survey was conducted to confirm the families' intention to repatriate the remains of the two national heroes, who are each buried in cemeteries in São Paulo and Curitiba, Brazil, respectively, by visiting the sites to check on the graves' maintenance status and discussing the detailed time and procedures with the families and local consulates.

Kim Gi-joo joined the replacement depot of the Korean Liberation Army Headquarters after escaping from the Japanese army and carried out independence activities, while Han Eung-gyu joined the 3rd squad of the 2nd force of the Liberation Army after escaping from the Japanese army and engaged in intelligence gathering as well as clandestine recruiting of Korean soldiers in the Japanese army.

In particular, Kim Gi-joo, who is a graduate of the Military Academy's 5th class, later received the Chungmu Order of Military Merit for his distinguished services during the Korean War, including in the battles of Hwaryeongjang and An'gang district. Both activists immigrated to Brazil, Kim Gi-joo in 1971 and Han Eung-gyu in 1972, and passed away in 2013 and 2003, respectively.

Additionally, the gravesite of independence activist Jang Deok-gi, also a member of the Korean Liberation Army buried in the Korean section of the La Oracion Cemetery near Buenos Aires, Argentina, was inspected. In the case of Jang Deok-gi, it was decided to continue to manage the site through regular visits in cooperation with the Korean Veterans Association in Argentina, according to the wishes of his family.

Jang Deok-gi was active in the 2nd force of the Liberation Army and joined the 1st team of the Pyeongando section of the Korean Liberation Army in May 1945 after receiving special training through the United States Office of Strategic Services (OSS). Liberation came while he was awaiting domestic infiltration operations. He immigrated to Argentina in 1977 and passed away in 1996.

Alongside the status survey in South America, MPVA also conducted surveys on the gravesites of independence activists buried in the United States, including Kim Jaeeun and Won Dae-sung in Georgia, and Jung Sung-jang in Tennessee.

In this process, MPVA discussed future gravesite management and support measures with local consulates, the Nashville Korean Association, and cemetery management offices, and the families of Kim Jae-eun and Jung Sung-jang were informed about the methods and procedures for the repatriation of remains. The families plan to decide on the repatriation after reaching a consensus among themselves.

Minister Kang Jung-ai expressed the significance of being able to repatriate the remains of Kim Gi-joo and Han Eung-gyu from Brazil and emphasized that MPVA will make every effort to prepare for the repatriation so that the two heroes can rest in peace in their homeland with national respect. She also stated that the status survey of independence activists' gravesites overseas, including those in South America, demonstrates the government's firm commitment to repatriating every last hero to their homeland and pledged to continue to devote efforts to honor the dedication of independence activists and their families.

Since the early 1990s, MPVA has been identifying and inspecting the location and management status of gravesites of independence activists buried worldwide, identifying a total of 346 gravesites in 18 countries including the United States, China, and Russia, and has repatriated the remains of 148 independence activists from 9 countries, including the United States, China, Russia, and Kazakhstan.
